PROPOSED DESIGNS FOR NEW SENIOR PLAYGROUND...

Playground Update

After the thorough process in which criteria for selection were drawn up and to which all of the children contributed via the school council, a group of parents (representing the Parent Group and Board) and staff met to evaluate the four proposed designs. The adults took into account the children's views and more prosaic items like the length of the warrantees on the different parts. The Playground Creations design was finally selected. As part of the process, the children indicated that there was a particular piece of equipment which they would like to see incorporated into whichever design was successful. This was communicated to the winning design team and a few further amendments were made.

A sum of \$54,000 has been put aside by the Board of Trustees for the playground and the \$8,000 raised in the spell-athon will also be put towards it. The Parent Group has agreed to underwrite the rest of the cost. A grant submission has been made and we are keeping everything crossed until we hear the outcome! If successful, this will reduce the Parent Group contribution so the funds they hold can be diverted to additional projects.

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The old for den school

The old playground is scheduled for demolition during the next school holidays. The Parent Group is keen to sell off the parts

for which there is a market so if you would like to lend a hand with that process, I am sure they would delighted to hear from you!

The construction of the new playground will be started during the same holidays and is scheduled for completion during the first week of next term.

NZEI News

As you may know, teachers and principals are attending Paid Union Meetings this week. After the rejection of the Ministry of Education's last offer, the subject under discussion will be, where to next? As a school, we manage the Paid Union Meetings during the school day by staggering our attendance, with teachers travelling to meetings across Auckland so that we are not all out at the same time. Although far from ideal, by doing this we manage to cover classes and minimise disruption to our families.

One of the main issues which teachers are keen to see the Ministry of Education address is support for children with Additional Needs. The current situation is that support for children who need that little bit extra is woefully underfunded. There is also inadequate access to specialist staff.

Another issue is, of course, pay. I know that many families are struggling to make ends meet in the current economic climate, particularly in Auckland. The fact remains, however, that it is becoming increasingly difficult to attract quality staff for our schools in central Auckland where it is so expensive to live. When I was first principal of Bayswater School, an advertisement for a fixed-term (temporary) class teacher job on basic pay would attract 70 to 80 applicants. This has long since not been the case, with many local schools having to advertise and re-advertise even well paid senior positions for want of appropriate applicants.

Parents should be aware that there is a proposal for further strike action on 29th May. We will keep you informed about the outcome of these meetings and let you know as soon as possible.

Bully-free New Zealand

As you will hopefully be aware, the children are focusing for the first three weeks of term on bullying prevention, as part of their learning. As a school, we are emphasising demonstrating kindness to one another. There is a chart of one hundred hearts in the library. These are being coloured in and named as children and staff notice others displaying kindness. The focus on bullying is part of a national and international movement which culminates in "Pink Shirt Day" on Friday 17th May. As part of this, the Board of Trustees has recently reviewed and updated the school's bullying procedures. These form part of the overall Health and Safety policies and procedures for which the board is responsible.

This week and last week's Māori phrase of the week (at the top of the newsletter) is the slogan for this year's New Zealand-wide Pink Shirt Day.

Last Thursday, Claire S Edwards (new teacher in R3, Whānau Kokoru) took two teams of rippa players out to an inter-schools tournament.
