Matariki



Ka puta Matariki ka rere Whānui. Ko te tohu tēnā o te tau e! Matariki reappears, Whānu (Vega) starts its flight. The new year begins!

"Matariki" refers to the star cluster also known as Pleiades, or the Seven Sisters. The stars can be seen most of the year, except for a period at the beginning of the cold months, when they disappear from view. Their reappearance in the pre-dawn sky in the middle of winter signals the beginning of the Māori New Year.

It is a time to celebrate new life, to remember those who've passed and to plan for the future. It's a time to spend with whānau and friends – to enjoy kai (food), waiata (song), tākaro (games) and haka.

Traditionally Māori would look to Matariki for help with their harvesting. When Matariki disappeared in April/May, it was time to preserve crops for the winter season. When it re-appeared in June/July, they would read the stars to predict the upcoming season – clear and bright stars promised a warm and abundant winter while hazy stars warned of a bleak winter.

Matariki has nine visible stars, according to leading Māori astronomer, Dr Rangi Matamua, who's been researching Matariki for over 30 years. The nine visible stars include: Matariki, Tupuārangi, Waipuna-ā-Rangi, Waitī, Tupuānuku, Ururangi, Waitā, Pōhutukawa and Hiwa-i-te-Rangi. Each star holds a certain significance over our wellbeing and environment, as seen from the Māori view of the world.

Celebrating Matariki at Bayswater School

All tamariki will be exploring and learning about Matariki over the next few weeks.

Whānau Kokoru will be researching Matariki then creating and sharing their findings digitally.



Keeping Ourselves Safe

During weeks 7 - 9 (14th June to 2nd July) of this term we will be teaching the personal safety programme Keeping Ourselves Safe.

Keeping Ourselves Safe has been designed to give students the skills to cope in situations involving abuse. It has three overall aims:

- to develop and strengthen children's skills to keep themselves safe with other people;
- to support and encourage abused children to get help from caring adults;
- to make teachers and parents/caregivers more aware of the need to keep children safe from abuse by adults or other children.

Keeping Ourselves Safe will be taught by your child's teacher, with support from the local Police School Community Officer as required.

To be successful, Keeping Ourselves Safe needs your help and support. Your child may have home learning activities to work on with you.

It is important that you participate as much as possible and talk to your child about what they have been learning. This will help reinforce the messages the school is giving, and help your child to use his or her new skills with confidence.




