Matariki Festival

Thank you once again to all our parents, caregivers, grandparents, brothers and sisters, aunties and uncles and past pupils who helped to once again make our Matariki Festival such a heartwarming fabulous community event! The amount raised was revealed at our final assembly last term \$21,490.28!



Our very own Pūkāea (long trumpet)

Tom Scrase, a past parent of Bayswater School is an expert at crafting traditional Māori instruments. As part of our Creatives in School grant we commissioned him to craft one for Bayswater School. Our pūkāea was handed over to us in a ceremony at the start of Matariki. Our pūkāea is called "Matariki" and features nine rings that represent the stars. Our pūkāea is made from recycled kauri and as is customary the shavings were planted beneath a new kauri planted at school. You will have seen, and heard Tom, as we were lucky enough for him to arrive for the presentation on the weekend of the festival so once again we were able to have him open our Matariki Festival but this time with our very own pūkāea.

Pūkāea are a traditional Māori instrument, wooden trumpets made from a long split hollowed length of wood with a bell shaped end which were bound tightly together with vine. They produce a loud dramatic trumpet-like sound known as kōkiri that can be heard over long distances. Skilled players can produce several notes and tones from a single instrument. Pūkāea were used at many occasions, particularly around the planting and harvesting of crops like kūmara. Pūkāea belong to the family of Tānemahuta, the Māori atua (diety) of the forests and birds.

Some of our tamariki will be able to include the sounds of the pūkāea in their recorded stories.

Board of Trustees' 2022 Triennial Elections

Nominations are open for the election of *3 parent representatives* to the school board. *Nominations close at noon on Wednesday 3 August 2022*. You may provide a signed candidate statement and photograph with your nomination. The electoral roll is held at the school and can be viewed during normal school hours. As nominations are received, there will be a list of candidates' names kept at the school up until election day, which you can view.

Voting closes at 4pm on Wednesday 7 September 2022.

What is a school board of trustees?

Almost all state and state integrated schools in New Zealand have a board of trustees. School board membership includes parent representatives, a staff representative, a student representative (where there are students above year 9) and the principal. Your board may also include other types of trustees. Contact your school for more information on the composition of your school's board.

Who can become a trustee?

Parents, caregivers and people from the wider community can put their name forward to be on a school board during the board of trustee elections.

What do trustees do?

The board is accountable to its parents and community and for student progress and achievement. Here are some specific things a board does:

- Sets the strategic direction and plans for the school and monitors the school's progress against them.
- · Monitors and evaluates student progress.
- Oversees the management of staff, property, finances, curriculum and administration.
- Ensures that the educational needs and aspirations of Maori learners, Pasifika learners and learners with special learning and behaviour needs are identified, planned for and met.
- Fulfils the intent of the Treaty of Waitangi by valuing and reflecting New Zealand's dual cultural heritage.
- Appoints and supports the principal and assesses their performance.

What skills do trustees need?

Trustees are active leaders in their schools and need to work well in a team, ask challenging questions and have good communications skills. Boards need a balance of skills and experiences around the table to ensure effective processes for planning, monitoring, reporting and reviewing of the school's performance are in place.

What help do school trustees get?

New Zealand School Trustees Association provides free advice around employment and governance, support and resources.
