#### Visit from Local Bird Photographer

#### News from the Kahui Ako (Community of Learning)

Bayswater School is part of the Devonport Takapuna Kahui Ako (or Community of Learning) along with Takapuna Grammar School, Belmont Intermediate School and four other local primary schools. Part of the job of the Kahui Ako is to help us to make children's learning pathways (transitions from early childhood and from school to school) as smooth as possible. Staff from all the schools work together, to learn from one another about how we can best help all children to achieve personal excellence.




One of the projects which Bayswater is working on with staff from TGS is a tuakana/teina writing support programme. Tuakana/teina refers to the relationship between an older (tuakana) person and a younger (teina) person and is specific to teaching and learning. In our case, all our senior students have a mentor buddy from Y10 at TGS, who provides them with feedback on their writing via their google drive. Claire Edwards (teacher in Whānau Puna) and Linda McPhail (teacher in Whānau Kokoru) spent time with the Y10 students, training them on how to give appropriate feedback. Our children walked up to TGS to meet up with their buddies. The programme is now under way, with Y10 students making helpful comments and suggestions in response to what our children write. Students from both schools will be meeting up in week four for a writing sharing session.

We are optimistic that the project will have a positive effect on our children's writing but are also keen to see the impact that having such great role models will have on their ambitions for themselves and attitudes to learning more generally.

#### **Head Lice**

Like most schools, we have a recurring problem with head lice! To help keep this problem under control, there are several things which we can all do. The first and most important is to check the whole family's heads regularly and treat if necessary. One of the



ways which head lice can persist is when we just check and treat the children. Adults also need to be checked and that includes parents, grandparents, nannies... anyone who has regular contact with the kids.



A second way we can help stop head lice from spreading and re-infesting is to teach children about how to reduce the likelihood of transfer from one person to another at school. Head lice cannot 'jump' and cannot live off a human head eg in a hat or on a pillow, for very long (they typically die within 24 hours). Children should, therefore, avoid direct head-to-head contact to minimise their risk of catching lice.

We appreciate that head lice are an annoying (and expensive) problem for us all. #### **Teacher Shortages and Contract Negotiations**

On Tuesday 19<sup>th</sup> June the teachers' union (NZEI) has called for a teachers' meeting to present the Ministry of Education's offer regarding the teachers' contract negotiations. At this meeting, teachers will vote to accept or reject the offer. Teachers who are union members have a legal right to attend this meeting. We ask that parents and whanau who are able to please collect their children from school at 12:50 pm on Tuesday 19<sup>th</sup> June. If you would like your child to walk home unaccompanied at 12:50 on this day, please email the office at <u>admin@bayswater.school.nz</u>. Children who must remain at school will be supervised and can be collected at the normal time from the hall.

- Over the past six years, there has been a 40% drop-off in those training to teach
- 40% of new teachers leave the profession in the first five years
- 35% of our experienced teachers will be eligible to retire during the next 10 years and many are leaving early

The Minister of Education Chris Hipkins has described recruitment and retention of teachers as "a ticking time bomb".

Our children deserve the best education. However, that can only happen when there is a supply of committed, talented teachers and principals. A successful outcome to the current teacher contract negotiations is central to addressing this teacher shortage.

We are hoping that we can rely on the support of our community in this critical matter. We know from past experience, such as when the Ministry tried to increase class sizes, that when the community is behind us we have a much stronger voice.
